RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All articles intended for exhibit must have legible tickets attached. Tickets can be obtained from the secretary and the Kirkton Market.
2. No two persons shall be eligible to compete for prizes of the same class of the same form.
3. All stock exhibited must be bona fide property of the exhibitor at time of entry, and all grain, roots, vegetables, plants, dairy produce, fruits, flowers and all articles of manufacture must be the property of the exhibitor, the growth or make of the present year and the production of their farm or holding.
4. No animal or article shall be permitted to compete for more than one prize except in herd or for Special prize.
5. All persons showing articles or animals must show in class specified for such article or animal.
6. In sections where there is one exhibit, the judge shall be empowered to award a second or third prize where they consider the exhibit does not merit a first prize.
7. Only one prize will be allowed to an exhibitor in a section.
8. If an error or omission occurs in the prize list, the Directors have the power to correct the same.
9. Displays and exhibits will be accepted on Thursday, September 7, 2022 between 6:30 pm - 8:30 pm and Friday, September 8, 2022 between 8:30 am – 12:00 pm. No late entries will be accepted.
10. All displays and exhibits **MUST BE REMOVED** on Sunday September 10, 2023 between 11:30am – 12:30 pm.
11. Any person violating any of the foregoing rules shall be ineligible to compete for a prize.
12. The Directors will take every precaution to ensure the safety of the exhibits sent to the Exhibition. However, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and should any exhibit be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will not be responsible.
13. All protests must be in writing stating the cause of complaint and must be delivered to the Secretary as soon as possible after the judge or judges have given their decision upon the article or animal in question. The sum of \$5.00 shall be deposited with the Secretary in each case of protest, the same to be forfeited if the appeal is not sustained. The Board may decide the matter of protest or may appoint a new judge or judges to decide the same and such decisions shall be final.
14. The Treasurer will pay prize money by cheque by the first of October, 2023.
15. Prize money cheques will be void after November 30, 2023.
16. The Society will not hold itself responsible for any accidents that might occur on the grounds during the Fair.
